BOARD OF RECREATION AND PARK COMMISSIONERS
OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES

June 6, 2001

The Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners of the City of Los Angeles convened in regular session at 9:40 a.m. Present were Vice President LeRoy Chase, Commissioners Robert W. Nizich and Lisa Specht. Absent: Commissioner David Michaelson. Also present were Ellen Oppenheim, General Manager and Assistant City Attorney Mark Brown.

MEMORANDUM

OPERATIONAL PLAN FOR PEDLOW SKATE PARK

Assistant General Manager (AGM) Kevin Regan stated Pedlow was the first skate park to open in the City. The Department has learned much on community and safety issues. Operations at Pedlow are going well and staff is looking forward to further expansion.

MEMORANDUM

EUCALYPTUS TREES DYING IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA AND IN THE LOS ANGELES CITY PARKS

The General Manager stated that a disease has been infested in the Eucalyptus Trees and staff has tried some unconventional measures to eradicate the problem. This is a significant issue throughout Southern California. The City and the Department have been collaborating with outside consultants and other agencies, as well as experimenting with different techniques. There are a significant number of Eucalyptus trees that will be removed, which will result in a budget issue. The immediate issue is with removal and infestation. These trees will be removed due to potentially hazardous conditions, and the Department will follow a protocol notification process to notify neighbors and park users of the removal. Staff will continue to review and update the Commission with recommendations.

In response to an inquiry from Commissioner Chase, Ms. Theresa Prostevic stated there are approximately 1,000 Eucalyptus Trees currently on golf courses and lining the roads of Griffith park. There are also approximately 30,000, counting undeveloped areas, of the hillside of Elysian Park and Griffith Park. The current problem is with about 5,000 trees in actively used recreation areas that will in all likelihood be removed.

MEMORANDUM

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REVISED GREEK THEATRE

The General Manager reported on revisions to the Greek Theatre RFP that were considered and approved by the Board at its meeting of May 16, 2001. The General Manager brought attention to the Naming Rights Sponsorships portion of the memorandum, which was added after the meeting that stated:

Naming rights sponsorships are prohibited. The following has been added to the sample agreement in the RFP:

"The concessionaire will not permit the Theatre or any portion of the premises to be named for a sponsor."

In response to an inquiry from Commissioner Nizich, the General Manager stated that this binds the concessionaire and does not bind the Department. The Department will allow the concessionaire the opportunity to get appropriate sponsorship, however, this should not include renaming the facility.

GENERAL MANAGER'S ORAL REPORT

The General Manager reported on the following events held in the last two weeks throughout the City:

- Mr. Cleveland (Cleve) Williams has been appointed as the Department's Golf Manager. Mr. Williams is currently the Executive Director for the Department of Recreation and Parks for the City of Santa Ana, and has been the General Manager in the cities of Oakland, California and Portland, Oregon.
- The Cabrillo Aquarium Renovation has received the Cultural Affairs Commission Architectural Design Excellence Award.
- Salute to Recreation held last week in the Valley was very successful thanks to staff efforts.

The Master Plan's Mitigated Negative Declaration was prepared in May 1998 and is in compliance with CEQA requirements. The document was adopted by City Council on June 9, 1998 and a Notice of Determination was filed with the County Recorder and City Clerk on June 7, 1998.

It was moved by Commissioner Specht, seconded by Commissioner Nizich, that Board Report No. 01-187, be approved with amendments. There being

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no objections, the Motion was approved.

Sonia Vasquez, representing Girls Club of Los Angeles/Committee for Smoke Free Parks spoke in support of the project and offered their services to help with education and public awareness.

It was moved by Commissioner Specht, seconded by Commissioner Nizich, that Board Report No. 01-191, be approved. There being no objections, the Motion was approved.

NON-RESPONSIBLE BIDDER - BEGL CONSTRUCTION, INC.

At the request of the General Manager, AGM Maureen Tamuri, summarized staff's recommendation that the Board declare Begl Construction Co., (Begl) to be found a Non-Responsible Contractor and ineligible to bid on City Contracts. AGM Tamuri stated that there were four issues:

1. On Shane's Inspiration Restroom Facility, the original contract completion date was November 19, 2000 (100 calendar days). The Contractor was placed on notice of Liquidated Damages on November 30, 2000 and December 13, 2000. The Contractor did not receive project final approval from Building and Safety until January 19, 2001. The Department was not able to take substantial occupancy of the structure until February 12, 2001, 85 days beyond the original completion date. 75 days appear to be non-compensable delays. On the Palisades Recreation Center' new gymnasium, Begl was assessed \$228,000.00 in Liquidated Damages for 304 days of delay which were determined to be non-compensable after a hearing before this Board. In addition, 172 days extension was granted making the project 476 days beyond the original scheduled completion date. Still, no payment of Liquidated Damages to date. Begl has blamed the City for all delays and has filed litigation alleging \$600,000.00 to \$840,000.00 in damages currently pending in Superior Court.
2. The Contractor was not abiding by the contract requirements in which staff did not receive contract schedules, the Contractor provided very little substantive documentation. The contractor did not follow the directives of the department, which is a provision of the Contract. This made the job very difficult. He also did not hire youth as required under proposition A; in his bid, he promised to provide 1900 hours of youth employment; only 122 hours were recorded on the project. Failure to comply with the contracted hours of Youth Employment may put the City in jeopardy of losing grant funds.
3. Bad faith toward subcontractors, there were many Stop Notices filed, and many still outstanding. The City has been named in two

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lawsuits filed by subcontractors who were not paid by Begl. In one case, Begl bonded around the stop notice, yet has still not paid the subcontractor after the City released funds to him for that purpose.

4. Numerous labor violations. Manny Perez of Office of Contract Compliance (OCC) described the labor violations as willful and fraudulent, and that the Contractors actions were a form of embezzlement. He stated that the City intends to pursue this matter as a theft. The City findings have been affirmed by the State Labor Commissioner. Mr. Mario Interiano of OCC, summarized the City's findings as to labor violations by Begl.

AGM Tamuri introduced Manny Perez, Labor Compliance Analyst, Office of Contract Compliance (OCC) to further explain the violations. Mr. Perez stated that the Contractor failed to pay prevailing wages and keep accurate records of the number of workers and the hours on the job site. Many claims were filed by workers who were paid at \$7.00 to \$10.00 per hour when the proper wages are \$12.00 to \$15.00 per hour. They willfully and intentionally took advantage of situations. They did not document and provide accurate certified records. Mr. Perez introduced Mario Interiano, Labor Compliance Officer, OCC, to explain in detail OCC's findings. Mr. Interiano reported the following:

1. Begl Construction is charged with violating California Labor Codes 1774, 1776, 1712, 1778, 223 and 226.
2. OCC's investigation revealed that Begl Construction intentionally mis-classified workers, under reported days and hours worked and purported cash advances to workers that resulted in the secret payment of lower wages to workers.
3. On May 19, 1998, OCC informed Begl Construction of the prevailing wage requirements prior to the commencement of this project and provided forms to be submitted as part of the reporting requirements. Followed up with a letter reminding the contractor of his prevailing wage responsibilities.
4. In March 1999, OCC analysts conducted interviews that revealed troubling information. The workers claimed that they were forced to sign a blank form as a condition for receiving their wages. OCC reviewed the certified payrolls which contained an unprecedented number of cash advance forms issued to workers, which were not the required forms provided by OCC.
5. As a result of these findings, OCC conducted an audit on August 4, 1999. At this audit, Mr. Beglari indicated that he had failed to keep required documentation of the so called "cash advances." OCC took this opportunity to caution Mr. Beglari of his business practice of issuing cash advances and the necessity of maintaining a record of the transactions. OCC again provided Mr. Beglari with the proper form for reporting "other" deductions (OCC-2).

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6. Additional complaints received, prompted a second audit held October 1, 1999. OCC again cautioned Mr. Beglari of his "cash advance" business practice. OCC also discovered that Begl Construction was under reporting workers. When confronted with this issue Begl Construction's response was that the persons not reported were specialty subcontractors, but when asked to provide 1099 Forms and License numbers it was unsuccessful.
7. Additional interviews and complaints also revealed that Begl Construction was also under reporting worker's hours. Due to the seriousness of the claims and the complexity of the investigation, OCC withheld the full retention amount (\$141,983.14).
8. After several meetings with Begl Construction and their counsel, OCC was able to review time sheets kept by Begl Construction. The time sheets were formatted in a manner that described the type of work performed by the workers which contradicted the payrolls. After discussing this issue with the inspector (Caryn DePrez), she indicated that workers would claim a particular classification, but would perform work of a different classification.
9. After review of all the documentation, OCC prepared the wage restitution assessment which totaled \$55,575.54 in wages and \$41,850.00 for straight time penalties and \$125.00 for overtime penalties.
10. OCC presented this case before a State of California Department of Labor Standards Enforcement appointed hearing officer which found that the City had just cause in withholding the amounts assessed.

Mr. Interiano closed in stating that OCC believes that these violations were intentional and recommends that staff recommendations be approved.

At this point, Commissioner Specht asked the City Attorney if these violations alone were sufficient grounds to declare the Contractor Non Responsible. The City Atty indicated that due to the fact there was a probable cause finding, the findings would allow the Board to make a finding of non-responsibility on that basis alone.

In closing, AGM Tamuri summarized that Begl made these projects difficult for the City and the Community, who donated over \$700,000 to construct the gym at the Palisades Recreation Center. Their carelessness and labor violations were numerous. They were in breach of their contract and in disregard to their Duty. The department does not want to work for them again.

Commissioner Specht said, "Maureen, there was a Freudian slip in your summary when you said the Department does not want to work for them again. I think what you meant to say was that the Department does not want them to work for it again, and I can certainly understand why you felt that way."

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In response to an inquiry from Commissioner Nizich, the Assistant City Attorney stated that the third party officer of the State made a finding that made Begl Construction in violation of the City contract.

In response to an inquiry from Commissioner Specht, AGM Tamuri stated that there are four projects pending in which Begl Construction could be awarded. Three are with the Department of Recreation and Parks and one is with the Bureau of Engineering. AGM Tamuri stated that they had consulted and worked with the department of Engineering in making this recommendation of Non-responsibility.

Bruce Rudman, Attorney, Abdulaziz & Grossbart, representing Begl Construction, submitted an alleged 1,500 pages of documentation to the Board Secretary for the record. The representative stated that their firm submitted a request for a three-hour hearing via certified mail to the Department's Executive Officer and that the Department has rushed this matter to hearing in just a week because it wants to preserve its Proposition K dollars that Begl is informed will be lost on June 30, 2001.

The Assistant City Attorney stated that the report was delivered to Begl 13 days prior to the Board meeting thereby providing adequate notice.

The Begl's representative stated the following: that the declaration of non-responsibility was a very serious act and that Begl Construction had the right to present its case; that Begl is an outstanding contractor who has successfully completed many other public works contracts; that Begl Construction currently has an \$800,000.00 claim filed against the City for what Begl contends were problems caused by the City or its agents; that Begl believes the Department is acting in bad faith and with malice towards Begl because Begl has filed its lawsuits against the Department; that it is alleged that Begl mismanaged the job in that there were a large number of change orders, in that Begl violated the prevailing wage laws, and that Begl was late in its performance and has been assessed liquidated damages. All allegations are contested.

The representative further stated that the Pacific Palisades project was completed on April 15, 2000, however, the sewer was not connected until July. Begl did provide project schedules. There were 121 approved change orders on this project; this would indicate that there were problems with the project to begin with in the plans and site conditions. Change orders requesting time and money were not approved. In that the Department approved 121 change orders, it cannot now argue that they were not justified. Begl reported problems with access panels for hand dryers which took three weeks for approval from the Department.

In response to an inquiry from Vice President Chase, the representative stated that he was not fully informed on the issue of youth employment and that this inquiry should be directed to Mehr Beglari. In closing the representative stated there was no evidence of embezzlement.

Mehr Beglari, President, Begl Construction Co., Inc., stated that Begl

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Construction is a reputable company and is called upon to do many County jobs. He expressed his frustrations with City staff in that change order recommendations to the Architect or Project Manager took several months to be approved. When these change orders were received by the Contractor, response by the Contractor was immediate. The Contractor stated there were problems with underground utilities and it took the Department one and a half weeks to send someone out. There was a one month loss in the beginning of the job due to change orders which were approved, however, these also required additional time. At the time he started the work, the plans were not approved. The Architect requested additional water fountains which required additional time. The roof was a bad design which the Contractor made clear to Department staff at the onset of the project.

Commissioner Chase had serious concerns about not utilizing Youth Employment as required by the contract.

In response to an inquiry from Vice President Chase, Mr. Beglari stated that it was difficult to comply with the youth employment requirement. The Contractor sent letters to the Youth Department requesting youth for employment, however, no youth reported to the job site, and some subcontractors do not allow youth labor force.

In response to an inquiry from Commissioner Nizich, Mr. Beglari stated that the original bid required that 1,900 hours be used toward youth employment; at the completion of the project the Contractor had utilized 122 hours toward youth employment. Mr. Beglari confirmed that per the contract, youth employment requirements were the responsibility of the Contractor. Mr. Beglari also stated that the project was substantially complete on April 14, 2000, however, was not complete until June 29, 2000 due to the sewer line repairs.

Clarence S. Kurisu, K&K Consultants, who was retained by Begl Construction, gave a technical analysis and discussion of the effect of the Department's denial of change orders requested by Begl Construction. The representative found that the charges to Begl Construction were unmerited in that the Designer should have accommodated in the design process and not in construction; 300 calendar days should have been granted for additional time, only 144 were approved.

In response to a request from Commissioner Nizich to provide details on one area of impact to the critical path, the representative stated that the impacts to the roof were one such area. He stated that this work was always on the critical path of the Contract. The representative stated that from March 4, 1999 to July 12, 1999 the job was delayed due to the Department's late issuance of change orders for the roof, and therefore, no work could be done on this critical path. He stated that three change orders impacted Begl's ability to proceed with the roof, which were: Change Order Nos. 57, 92, and 99C.

AGM Tamuri stated that during the period of March 1999 through July 1999 there were a series of activities in which the Department received a

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request for substitution of the roofing subcontractor from Begl. The listed subcontractor objected. Roofing material which was delivered to the job site was the wrong product. The submittals for the roofing were not received until April 23, 1999 at the midpoint of this alleged delay period. AGM Tamuri pointed out that two of the change orders in question were for \$3,700 and \$515 and did not contain a request for additional time; the third was for \$19,000 for additional roofing costs and was denied by the department as the Contractor was the one who requested the product as a substitution for that specified. The Department did not impact the roofing portion of the project.

Carelessness in their workmanship. AGM Tamuri stated that there were many instances of shoddy workmanship in which damage to existing park facilities occurred. Repairs were often undertaken by Recreation and Parks staff due to Begl's refusal to initiate repairs unless they were paid under a change order. There are still items of the work left unrepaired to the satisfaction of the department.

Mr. Rudman stated that two subcontractors currently have pending lawsuits against the City. He also stated that in regards to the Labor Code violations on Prevailing Wages, all certified logs were provided to OCC. The youth issues could be considered a major or minor breach of contract, it was up to the Board.

The Assistant City Attorney stated that all delays were previously approved by the Board and liquidated damages were imposed. Then Commission President Steven Soboroff, requested that staff meet with the Contractor to resolve pending issues on the Palisades Recreation Center new gymnasium. These meetings did not prove to be fruitful.

In closing, Mr. Beglari stated that prior to the hearing on November 15, 2000 there was one other hearing in which liquidated damages were discussed, this meeting only lasted five minutes in which staff determined this was the way to go per the City Attorney. The second meeting was held without the Contractor being present. Mr. Beglari stated he had heard a tape recording of this meeting in which there was no discussion on the matter.

The General Manager stated that any items discussed by the Board are on Agendas which are publicly Noticed 72 hours prior to the meeting per the Brown Act and are placed on the City's website.

Commissioner Specht stated that staff has been perhaps too patient; Begl has made numerous broken promises; the Contractor has fought staff every step of the way; there have been numerous labor code and prevailing wage violations; the Contractor has shown a lack of integrity with employees, contractors, and the City. We expect our contractors to work with staff, not fight them tooth and nail every step of the way.

Based on the below findings:

A. Begl failed to Comply with the required 1900 hours of Youth

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Employment;

- B. Begl delayed both projects and owed the city \$288,000 in Liquidated Damages on one of the projects;
- C. Begl did not deal fairly with subcontractors;
- D. Begl violated Prevailing Wage Laws; and
- E. Begl was careless in their workmanship;

it was moved by Commissioner Specht, seconded by Commissioner Nizich, that Report No. 01-209, be approved. There being no objections, the Motion was approved.
