#### RECOMMENDATION:

#### That the Board:

- 1. Accept, subject to approval by the City Council and Mayor, a grant from the Department of Justice. Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, in the amount of \$59,199, for the Wrigley Little League Program at Gilbert Lindsay Recreation Center;
- 2. Direct staff to transmit the grant award documentation to the Mayor and City Council for approval pursuant to Los Angeles Administrative Code Section 14.7; and
- 3. Authorize the General Manager, subsequent to necessary approvals, to execute the resulting grant agreement and subsequent amendments thereto, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.8 et seq. as may be amended, on behalf of the City, subject to approval as to form by the City Attorney.

#### SUMMARY:

The Department is requesting permission to accept a grant from the United States Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) in the amount of \$59,199 for the Gilbert Lindsay Recreation Center, Wrigley Little League Program. Department staff was approached by a representative of Congressman Xavier

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Becerra of the 31<sup>st</sup> Congressional District, who indicated that funds were available through OJJDP, and relayed the Congressman's desire that the Department apply for those funds to be used to service at-risk youth in his district. At the time that the Department was made aware of the availability of these funds, time was of the essence in the face of an impending deadline for the application process. Department Grants Accounting staff applied for the grant and was subsequently awarded \$59,199 from OJJDP, in accordance with the budget submitted (see attachment).

Gilbert Lindsay Recreation Center, located in South Los Angeles, on the site of the original Wrigley Field, serves one of the most underserved inner-city communities in the country, where more than 90% of the students qualify for federal meal programs. While this community is economically poor, they are ethnically rich with a population composed of 59% Latino and 39% African American and the Wrigley Little League participants reflect this diversity. The Wrigley Little League Program currently serves 120 at-risk children, ages 5-12, by offering them an opportunity to learn positive socialization skills through organized sports teams. Students participate in baseball clinics, practice sessions, and games to finetune their athletic skills, while learning how to cooperate and work as a team. This federal funding will allow for expansion of the Wrigley Little League Program, as well as cover much needed equipment costs. The purpose of this project is to improve program facilities and resources to better serve an increased number of youth. The expanded population and number to be served is approximately 150-250 boys and girls, ages 4-14. Gilbert Lindsay Recreation Center has been the recipient of equipment donations from such sponsors as Wilson Sporting Goods and Sunkist. Additionally, the Dodger Dream Foundation has funded field enhancements, including foul poles, new backstops, a new storage shed, and a snack bar. Grant funds will be used to enhance the program facilities by providing batting cages and a pitching machine, thereby affording more practice time; as well as a van for transporting children to other parks for games.

## **FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT:**

This grant does not require a match and results in no fiscal impact to the General Fund.
