Los Angeles City Administrative Code

"The Public Welfare and Shelter Division shall be under and subject to the control of the Department of Recreation and Parks of the City of Los Angeles. The Chief of this division shall be the General Manager of the Department. The chief shall be responsible for arranging, directing and coordinating sheltering services for persons rendered homeless as a result of a local emergency."

- Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activation Level 3
- Hurst fire starts (10:29 a.m.)
- Palisades fire starts (10:30 a.m.): RAP activated Department Operations Center (DOC) to Level 2
- Sustained operations 24/7 staffing
- Continuity of Operations Plan Team (COOP) activated
- Damage Assessments begin
- Park closures








Timeline January 8-10, 2025

Timeline January 12-17, 2025

- Support camps open at Mar Vista RC and Oakwood RC
 - Partners include Project Camp, LA Zoo, Play Equity/LA84, LA Library
- Additional shelters demobilized
- Air quality relief centers established
- Disaster Recovery Center opens to the public







Timeline January 24, 2025

- Air purifier distribution event
- Sandbag fill stations established

- EOC/DOC continues response efforts
- Debris flow mitigation and recovery efforts underway
- After action debriefs underway



- Some damage to George Wolberg Park at Potrero Canyon

- Approx 42 acres of natural area damaged at Runyon Canyon Park
- Minor damage to shade structures at Wattles Garden Park
- West Trail remains closed

- Peak residents served: 619
- Peak pets sheltered: 21
- Peak large animals sheltered: 542
- Support camps: 2 (120)
- Project Camp: 2 (46)
- Total operational periods: 25 (as of 1/31/2025)

Sunset Fire @ Runyon Canyon Park

- Number of Rangers responded: 9
 - Average number of additional Rangers on duty above normal staffing levels during extreme fire weather event
- Number of fires extinguished: 51
 - Number of vehicles utilized: 13
 2 Engines, 2 Water Tenders, 9 Brush Patrols
 - Number of arrests: 7
 - Number of citations:14

RAP Staff Impacts

- 171 Number of RAP staff reported to be directly impacted
- 61 Number of staff reported to have been evacuated
- 38 Number of staff with damaged property and/or lost homes





Red Flag Warnings and Parks in VHFSZ

- Following the wildfires, in response to a City Council request and out of an abundance of caution, RAP closed City parks in designated Very High Fire Severity Zones during Red Flag Warnings issued by the National Weather Service.
- RAP is coordinating with the Emergency Management Division and other City Departments on a report back in response to two City Council motions related to park closures and other City mitigation measures during Red Flag Warning and Particularly Dangerous Situation declarations.


